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1	Whereupon, the following proceedings were
2	transcribed from an audio recording:
3	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Read the message and
4	the amendment on CS/SB 254.
5	THE SECRETARY: The Honorable Kathleen
6	Passidomo, President.
7	I'm directed to inform the Senate that the
8	House of Representatives has passed committee
9	substitute for Senate Bill 254 with one amendment
10	and requests a concurrence of the Senate amendment
11	barcode 256341.
12	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: The senator of the
13	4th District, Senator Yarborough, you are recognized
14	for an explanation.
15	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
16	President.
17	Two weeks ago the House took up the Senate
18	bill and adopted an amendment that to a large degree
19	replaces the Senate bill's contents with that of its
20	House companion bill, with a few exceptions.
21	The title of the bill it maintains the
22	Senate title of "An Act Relating to Treatments for Sex
23	Reassignment" while replacing the Senate bill's use of
24	the term "sex-reassignment prescriptions or
25	procedures" with the House bill's "gender clinical

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1	interventions" throughout the amendment.
2	With regard to the definition of treatments,
3	it inserts the House bill's definition of the
4	treatments which differs substantively from the
5	- Senate definition in that the House language does not
6	exclude from the definition health care services that
7	are provided due to imminent danger of death or
8	impairment.
9	With regard to public expenditures, it makes
10	one change in that section, changes where we had
11	"state funds" in the Senate version, it replaces that
12	with simply "funds."
13	Related to birth certificates, it inserts
14	the House bill's provisions relating to birth
15	certificates which the Senate bill did not include.
16	It removes the sections we had related
17	to facility and office attestations.
18	On treatments for children, the House
19	amendment differs by providing the prescription
20	treatment for a minor may continue solely for the
21	purpose of gradual discontinuation only if the
22	treatment began before January 1 of this year, the
23	minor continuously received such treatment through
24	July 1 of this year, and the treatment is concluded
25	no later than December 31 of this year.

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1	With regard to the physician's physical
2	presence, whereas we had in the Senate version that
3	only for a new prescription that the physician would
4	have to be physically present in the same room, the
5	House version put each time the physician provides the
6	treatments.
7	For financial responsibility, it inserts the
8	House bill's requirement, which is not in the Senate
9	bill, for physicians who provide the treatment for
10	adults to obtain and maintain financial responsibility,
11	in the form of professional liability coverage,
12	to pay claims and costs arising out of the rendering
13	of such treatments.
14	With regard to the misdemeanor penalty, it
15	partially adopted the Senate bill's creation of a
16	first-degree misdemeanor for a health care
17	practitioner who provides the treatments to an adult
18	outside of the bill's requirements but applies the
19	provision only to a practitioner who willfully or
20	actively participates in a physician's violation of
21	the bill's requirements for obtaining informed
22	consent.
23	With regard to licensure revocation, it
24	inserts the House bill's requirement, which is not
25	in the Senate bill, for a health care practitioner,

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1 regulatory board, or the DOH if there is no board, 2 to revoke a practitioner's licence if he or she is 3 determined to have violated the bill's prohibitions 4 or requirements relating to providing the treatments.

5 It inserts the House bill's provision, 6 which is not in the Senate bill, to prohibit health 7 insurance policies and HMO contracts from providing 8 coverage for the treatments, regardless of the 9 patient's age.

10 It adds new cause of action language that 11 provides that a physician who renders the treatments 12 to a patient is liable to the individual for any 13 physical, psychological, emotional, or physiological 14 injury resulting from the treatments;

A patient who receives the treatments from a physician may bring a civil action for declaratory or injunctive relief, economic damages, noneconomic damages, punitive damages, without limits, and attorney fees and costs;

The estate of a patient who received the treatments from a physician, including a legal guardian on behalf of such individual, when the death of the patient was caused by the treatments, may bring a civil action against such physician for the same remedies listed above, as well as specified medical

Case 4:23-cv-00114-RH-MAF Document 179-6 Filed 11/06/23 Page 6 of 67 1 malpractice remedies, plus treble damages; and 2 An action brought under these provisions for 3 nonlethal injuries must be brought within 20 years 4 after the treatments, while an action for death must 5 be brought within 5 years of the death or the 6 discovery of the death, whichever is later. 7 And then, lastly, Madam President and 8 Senators, with regard to the effective date, it adopts 9 the Senate bill's effective date, which is upon the 10 bill becoming a law, instead of the House bill's effective date, which was July 1, 2023. 11 12 Madam President, that is the House change. 13 PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Is there an amendment 14 to the House amendment? SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Yes, ma'am. 15 16 PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Read the Senate 17 amendment to the House amendment. 18 I think the clerk has the amendment. 19 THE SECRETARY: Amendment barcode 738500 by 20 Senator Yarborough, delete lines 5 through 197 and 21 insert amendment. 22 PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough, 23 you're recognized to explain the Senate amendment to 24 the House. 25 SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam

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1	President.
2	After consulting with our House colleagues,
3	I am proposing to amend the House amendment to restore
4	the Senate's version of the bill with only two
5	revisions. The Senate amendment to the House
6	amendment contains the following differences from the
7	Senate bill we passed earlier this month.
8	First, the amendment no longer contains the
9	Senate bill's requirement for hospitals, ambulatory
10	surgical centers, and physician offices registered
11	for office surgeries to provide an attestation to
12	AHCA or DOH that they do not provide sex reassignment
13	treatments to minors, except for minors grandfathered
14	in under the bill.
15	After the bill takes effect, such treatments
16	will be illegal, and I agree with our House colleagues
17	that it is unnecessary to require the facilities to
18	attest that they are not breaking the law.
19	The second revision relates to the
20	continuation of prescription treatment for minors if
21	such treatment was commenced before and is still
22	active on the bill's effective date.
23	The Senate bill requires the Board of
24	Medicine and Osteopathic Medicine to adopt emergency
25	rules creating physician standards of practice for

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1	such minors within 60 days of the bill's effective
2	date. The amendment directs the boards when
3	developing those standards of practice to consider
4	whether the treating physician should obtain informed
5	consent from a minor's parent or legal guardian that
6	is consistent with the parameters of informed consent
7	that the bill requires for adults.
8	The amendment also directs the boards to
9	consider the provision of professional counseling
10	services for such minor patients by a board-certified
11	psychiatrist or a psychologist in conjunction with
12	the minor's prescription treatment.
13	Everything else in the amendment is identical
14	to the Senate bill we passed on this floor over to the
15	House on April 4, Madam President.
16	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Are there questions
17	on the Senate amendment to the House amendment?
18	Senator Polsky, you're recognized.
19	SENATOR POLSKY: Thank you.
20	Can you explain that last part about
21	it was about when insurance coverage no. I'm
22	sorry. Sorry.
23	The last part about when you can start and
24	stop treatment; is that what the last part was about?
25	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.

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1	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
2	President.
3	The second piece, Senator Polsky, was with
4	regard to what we had already established in our bill,
5	that they would adopt rules relating to standards of
6	care for minors grandfathered in. We're not directing
7	that they must do something, but we're saying they
8	must consider for those who are grandfathered in,
9	they need to consider whether the treating physician
10	should obtain informed consent from a minor's parent
11	or guardian, and then also direct the board to
12	consider the provision of professional counseling for
13	such minors by a board-certified psychiatrist or
14	psychologist in conjunction with the minor's
15	prescription treatment.
16	That's it.
17	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Any other questions?
18	Senator Jones.
19	SENATOR JONES: Thank you so much, Madam
20	President.
21	Senator Yarborough, would the specific
22	amendment that we have on here can you walk us
23	through this specific amendment?
24	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
25	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam

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1	President.
2	Senator Jones, that's what I just described.
3	We pretty much maintained Senate bill 254 the way we
4	adopted it on April 4, with the exception of removing
5	the requirement that the facilities have to do the
6	attestation to AHCA or DOH.
7	And then the second revision was simply
8	about, in my answer to Senator Polsky's question, to
9	direct the boards to consider items related to the
10	minors who were grandfathered in if they've already
11	been receiving treatments.
12	That's the only changes from the version we
13	already passed.
14	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Pizzo.
15	SENATOR PIZZO: Thank you, Madam President.
16	A question on procedure, because I'm trying
17	to do, like, six things right now.
18	After we find on this particular amendment
19	to the amendment, do we go back to questions
20	will we be going back to questions on our amended
21	version intended to be sent back to the House?
22	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: You're asking questions
23	now on the amendment. If our amendment is adopted,
24	then we will debate, and then we will move to consider
25	a vote on the bill again.

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1	SENATOR PIZZO: But, Madam President, debate
2	only, not questions after this amendment?
3	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Well, there's no
4	reason, because if this amendment is adopted, that's
5	it and we vote on it.
6	SENATOR PIZZO: Okay.
7	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: So if you have
8	questions, I suggest you ask them now.
9	SENATOR PIZZO: I'll ask them now.
10	Thank you.
11	We are, in this amended version to be sent
12	back to the House, still stripping local governments
13	and authorities of the ability to provide this
14	health care to their employees?
15	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
16	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
17	President.
18	Through the President and Senator Pizzo,
19	we maintain the provision that there is a prohibition
20	on the use of state funds or governmental funds
21	for items related in the bill, Senator.
22	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Pizzo.
23	SENATOR PIZZO: Thank you.
24	And I'm loathsome to ask particular questions
25	because it looks like over the last week things have

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1	come back with certain amendments on it, but I'll ask
2	it now because I think you guys are going to run out
3	of time on this.
4	There's no prohibition for a municipality,
5	let's say, for instance, to reimburse one of their
6	employees if they seek health care elsewhere and they
7	want to get a reimbursement from the city. Correct?
8	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
9	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
10	President.
11	That's not contained in the bill, Senator.
12	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Any other questions
13	on the Senate amendment?
14	Senator Martin.
15	SENATOR MARTIN: Thank you, Madam President.
16	Senator Yarborough, does the Senate amendment
17	still include the provision that there's a 20-year
18	statute of limitations if the surgery or transition
19	is wrong and there needs to be a civil action to
20	compensate the victim?
21	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
22	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
23	President. Thank you through the President to
24	Senator Martin.
25	We maintain in section 7, which is at the

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1	bottom of page 7 of the amendment before us, the
2	civil liability of sex reassignment prescriptions or
3	procedures to minors. That cause of action is still
4	in there the way that we adopted it on April 4.
5	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Jones.
6	SENATOR JONES: Thank you so much, Madam
7	President.
8	I just want to get clarification from Senator
9	Yarborough. Those who are over the age of 18, that
10	they are still grandfathered in and their services
11	would not be interrupted. Correct?
12	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
13	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
14	President.
15	Thank you, Senator Jones. Very good and
16	pertinent question.
17	So there's no change in that. We don't have
18	any law on the books today that speak to that, so
19	adults, as long as they meet the informed consent
20	requirement with the physician present and everything
21	that we adopted on April 4, there's no change in
22	that.
23	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Jones.
24	SENATOR JONES: Thank you so much, Madam
25	President.

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1	What about those who are under 18 who are
2	already going through the process? Are they
3	grandfathered in, or would those services be
4	interrupted?
5	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
6	SENATOR YARBOROUGH: Thank you, Madam
7	President.
8	That related to a couple of questions ago
9	where I described what our change would be. We
10	already established the process that the boards of
11	medicine Board of Medicine, Board of Osteopathic
12	Medicine have to go through their rulemaking process
13	and adopt those within 60 days of the effective date.
14	And all we're adding today is that they consider some
15	extra items whenever they are in that rulemaking
16	process, but the grandfather provision is still in
17	the bill.
18	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Jones.
19	SENATOR JONES: Thank you so much, Madam
20	President.
21	So just for clarity for, like, a 17-year-old,
22	will they still my question is would they still be
23	able to get care if they're already going through the
24	process currently now?
25	PRESIDENT PASSIDOMO: Senator Yarborough.
